Bless us with your holy presence, and inspire us to help those who have no place to dwell. Be with us that we might share Christ's love with all the world, for he is our light and salvation. Glory in heaven and peace on earth, now and forever. **Amen**.

#### Proclamation of the Birth of Christ

A: Today, the twenty-fifth day of December, unknown ages from the time when God created the heavens and the earth and then formed man and woman in his own image.

Several thousand years after the flood, when God made the rainbow shine forth as a sign of the covenant. Twenty-one centuries from the time of Abraham and Sarah; thirteen centuries after Moses led the people of Israel out of Egypt.

Eleven hundred years from the time of Ruth and the Judges; one thousand years from the anointing of David as King; in the sixty-fifth week according to the prophecy of Daniel.

In the one hundred and ninety-fourth Olympiad; the seven hundred and fiftysecond year from the foundation of the city of Rome.

The forty-second year of the reign of Octavian Augustus; the whole world being at peace, Jesus Christ, the eternal God and Son of the eternal Father, desiring to sanctify the world by his most merciful coming, being conceived by the Holy Spirit, and nine months having passed since his conception, was born in Bethlehem of Judea of the Virgin Mary.

Today is the nativity of our Lord Jesus Christ according to the flesh.

Through him all glory and honor are yours, Almighty Father, with the Holy Spirit, in your holy Church both now and forever. C: Amen



#### From Pastor Zook—A Christmas Reflection

"...But one thing I do, forgetting what lies behind and straining forward to what lies ahead, I press on toward the goal for the prize of the upward call of God in Jesus Christ." Philippians 3: 13b-14

In the Church decorations for Advent at Concordia, you'll notice that our banners and liturgical paraments are all colored Blue, a nod to our Swedish ancestry. Advent in the Swedish tradition is Blue, the color of those long, dark midnight skies of the Nordic winters defused with the first hints of light, the color of what is to come, the color of Hope.

Advent is the season of Hope, and hope is looking to the future with joyful

anticipation of wonderful things to come. St. Paul captures this Advent perspective with his description of a Christian life that strains forward, presses toward and reaches for the prize of our faith, the hope born of God's future for us in Christ. Like children eager for Christmas Day and the joy of what lies under the Christmas tree, let's be equally childlike in our outlook and stretch forward to the best that is yet to come.
